NEW LOOK, SAME OLD CHARM FOR CAMP RANDALL

One of college football's legendary facilities—Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium—has just undergone a four-year, \$109 million renovation. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements, however, have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm; rather, the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch their beloved Badgers play on Saturdays in the fall.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds.

Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3, 1917.

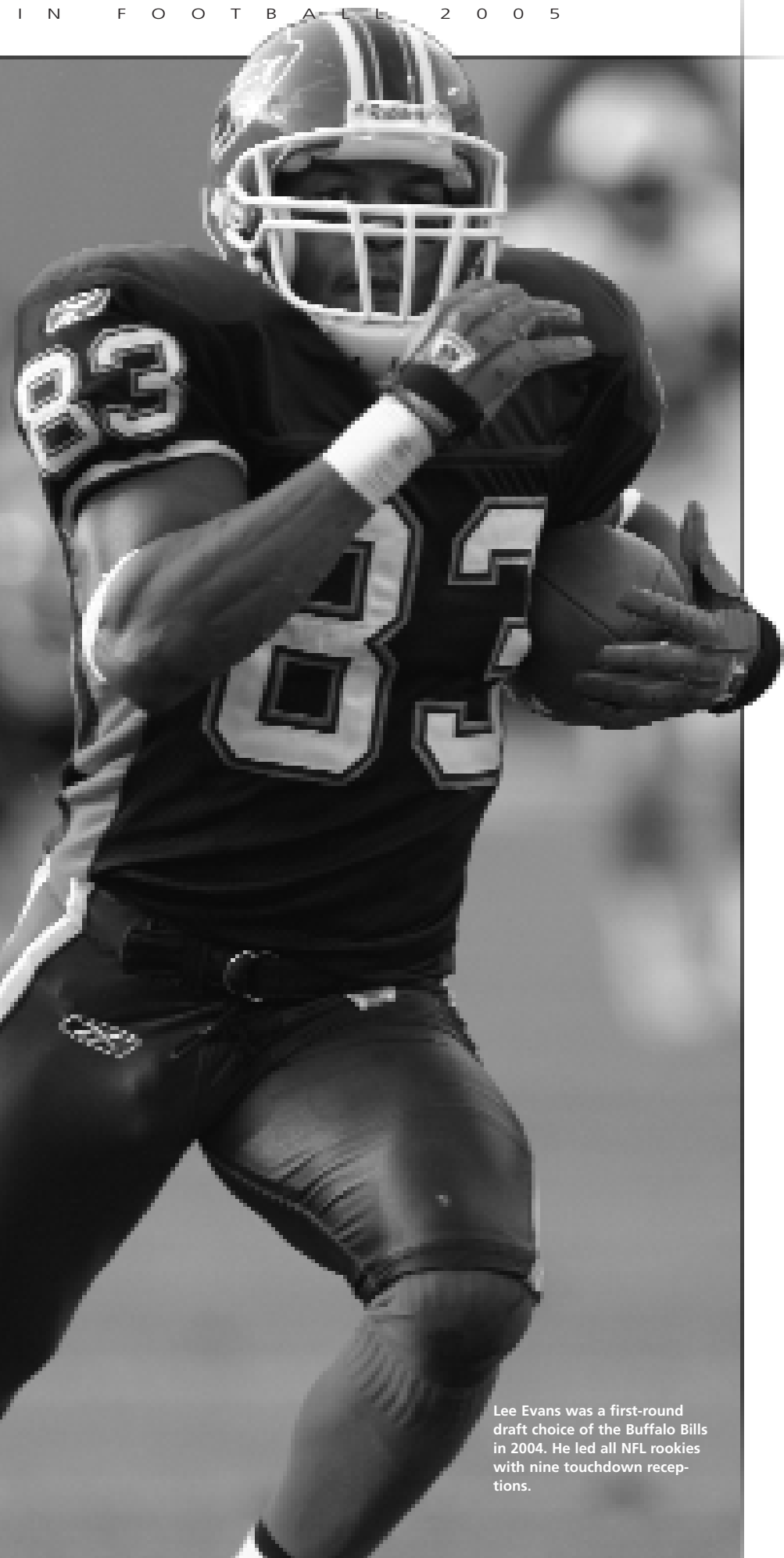

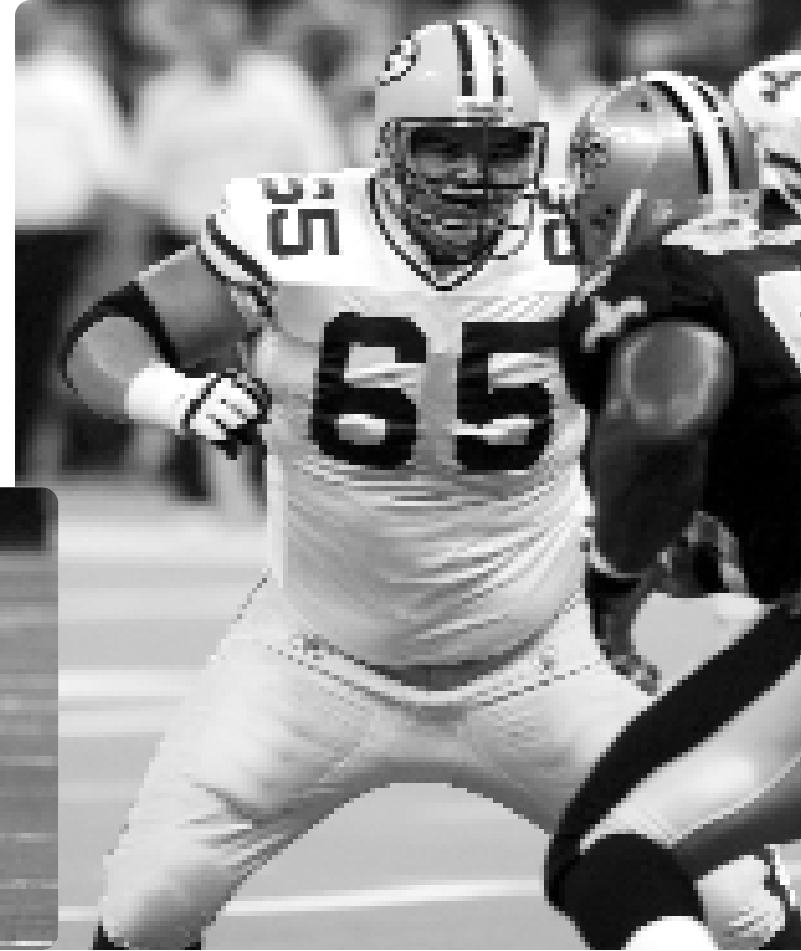

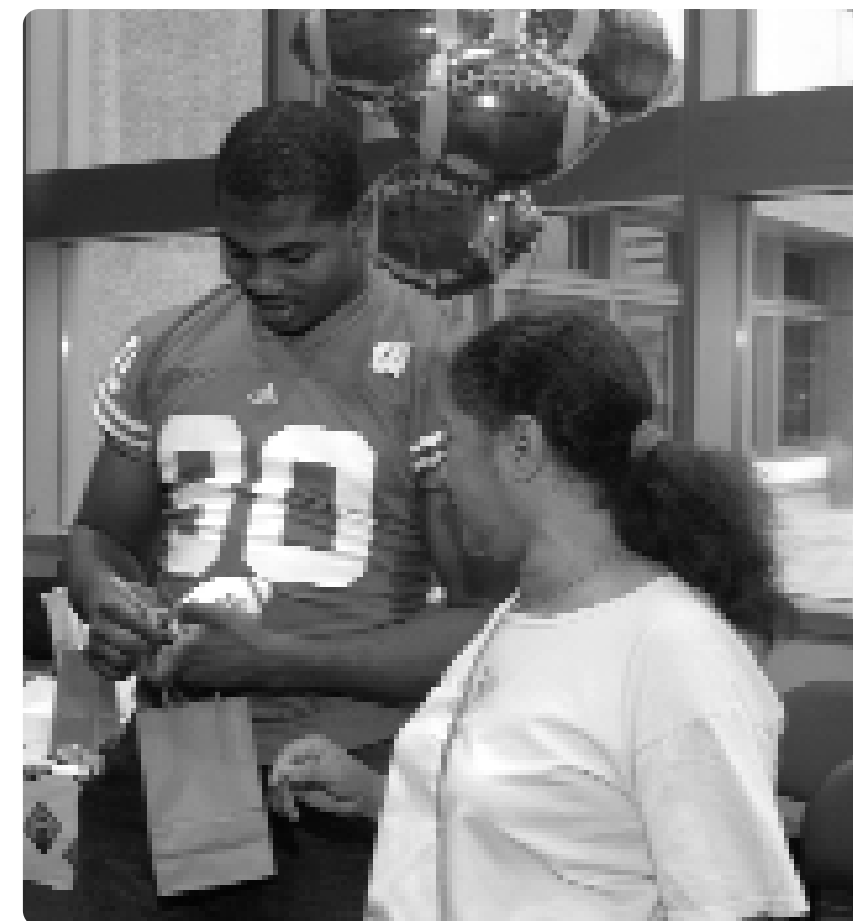


GOOD WORKS

He was cited for establishing an offseason program for players to visit the UW Children's Hospital. Martin also served as a mentor at the Southside Community Center, where he tutored and played with children.

Martin continued his charitable support as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles where he won the team's 2000 Ed Block Courage Award.

He also was named an "Unsung Hero" by the NFL Players' Association and was featured on the Fox Sports All-Madden Team as one of the National Football League's "good guys."

LEONHARD WAS ULTIMATE WALK-ON SUCCESS STORY

Jim Leonhard's (pictured) football accomplishments are worth noting all by themselves: three-time first-team All-American, three-time first-team All-Big Ten, holder of several Big Ten and school records for his play as both a defensive back and punt returner. But that's only half the story.

Leonhard's accolades off the field are just as impressive. A 2004 first-team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American as selected by CoSIDA, Leonhard was honored in New York as one of 15 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes (with that goes an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship).

The 5-8, 186-pound Leonhard (who once won a team basketball slam dunk competition), a native of tiny Tony, Wis. (pop. 105), will go down as one of the most decorated players (let alone walk-ons) of the Alvarez era.

MORE ACCOMPLISHED WALK-ONS FOR THE BADGERS

They may have been told by many non-believers in their senior years of high school that they weren't big enough or fast enough to contribute to a Big Ten football program. However, a number of individuals have gone on to make their mark on the University of Wisconsin football program during the Alvarez era by originally joining the team as a walk-on.

Below is a partial list of some of the individuals that joined the Badgers as non-scholarship players, only to make major impacts at the UW and beyond.

- **BOB ADAMOV, LINEBACKER:** four-year letterwinner; team captain and starter on the Badgers' 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; Ivan Williamson Scholastic Award winner in 1998; one of nine senior starters named team MVP his final season.
- **CHAD CASCADDEN, LINEBACKER:** named the team's Special Teams Player of the Year in 1994; Academic All-Big Ten selection his senior year; letterwinner on UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; played for the NFL's New York Jets.
- **MATT DAVENPORT, PLACEKICKER:** semi-finalist for Lou Groza Award; consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior, the most in school history for a placekicker; career field goal percentage (.868) is No. 1 at UW.
- **JASON DOERING, SAFETY:** team captain in both 1999 and 2000; led Badger defensive backs in tackles his final three sea-

sons; ranks fourth all-time in career solo tackles (250); starter on two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; currently plays for the NFL's New York Giants.

- **JOE PANOS, OFFENSIVE TACKLE:** team captain in 1993; starter on the Badgers' 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; first-team All-Big Ten and second-team AP All-American in '93; played for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Buffalo Bills.
- **MARK TAUSCHER, OFFENSIVE TACKLE:** three-year letterwinner; member of two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squads, including a starter on the 1999 team; helped Ron Dayne become NCAA all-time leading rusher; currently a starter for the NFL's Green Bay Packers.
- **DONNEL THOMPSON, LINEBACKER:** team captain in 1998 and 1999; starter on a pair of UW Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; ranks 10th all-time in career tackles; two-time team-leader in tackles; played for NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers and Indianapolis Colts.
- **MIKE SCHNECK, LONG SNAPPER:** three-year letterwinner at Wisconsin; member of 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; signed free agent contract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers.
- **SAM VEIT, PUNTER:** four-year starter and letterwinner; member of UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; ranks third all-time in career punts (209) and career punting yards (8,016); three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

Badger Bowl Success

Wisconsin's success in bowl games during Coach Barry Alvarez's tenure has been nearly unparalleled.

Alvarez has guided the Badgers to a 7-3 (.700) record in bowl games. That winning percentage is among the best in history.

Among those seven bowl victories are two Bowl Championship Series wins. Wisconsin is one of only four schools that remains undefeated with more than one BCS appearance. The others? Ohio State, LSU and Southern California.

Wisconsin's most recent bowl win was an upset of 14th-ranked Colorado, 31-28 OT, in the 2002 Alamo Bowl.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.

With 10 bowl appearances in the last 12 seasons, it's easy to see why Wisconsin has become a favorite choice among bowl games nationwide.

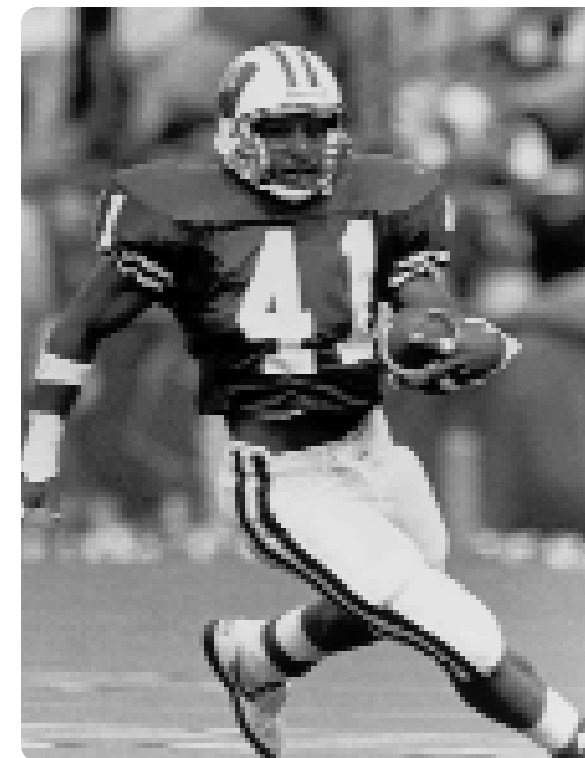
